Wow, here we are approaching the end of the year which is the subject of my 1<sup>st</sup> topic and that is "**ITS PAY YOUR DUES**" time. Well, you do have a couple more months, but hey, your Christmas bills will be coming down the chimney, so get this little chore out of the way.

Do you know about <u>WebFez?</u> It's the place you can look at the Membership Development System, review your Tehran Shriners, My Record (this is a goodie, it has all of <u>your</u> information in it) and then of course the help place (every one of you has one of these). If you sign in/up you will see your dues status. See, I did tie these two things together. Please visit **webfez.shrinenet.org**, sign up and look at the site occasionally as there are some great stories about the kids in our hospitals. Makes you want to be a Shriner and/or Proud to be a Shriner.

It's finally October, and you know what that means! Americans might actually start wearing masks.

OK, let's see what I can find out about October. **October** is the tenth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars and the sixth of seven months to have a length of 31 days. The eighth month in the old calendar of Romulus c. 750 BC, October retained its name (from the Latin and Greek  $\hat{o}ct\bar{o}$  meaning "eight") after January and February were inserted into the calendar that had originally been created by the Romans. You have to fast forward now - The last two to three weeks in October (and, occasionally, the first week of November) are normally the only time of the year during which all of the "Big Four" major professional sports leagues in the U.S. and Canada schedule games;

The **Oktoberfest** is the world's largest Volksfest (beer festival and travelling funfair). It is held annually in Munich, Bavaria, Germany. The Oktoberfest is an important part of Bavarian culture, having been held since the year 1810 *Kronprinz* Ludwig (1786–1868), later King Ludwig I (reign: 1825–1848), married Princess Therese of Saxe-Hildburghausen on 12 October 1810. The citizens of Munich were invited to attend the festivities (including horse races) held on the

The citizens of Munich were invited to attend the festivities (including horse races) held on the fields in front of the city gates to celebrate the royal event. It is widely believed that Andreas Michael Dall'Armi, a Major in the National Guard, proposed the idea of having this an annual event. However, the origins of Oktoberfest itself, may have stemmed from proposals offered by Franz Baumgartner, a coachman and Sergeant in the National Guard. The precise origins of the festival and horse races remain a matter of controversy. However, the decision to repeat the spectacle, and celebrations in 1811 launched what is now the annual Oktoberfest tradition. The city fathers assumed responsibility for festival management in 1819, and it was decided that Oktoberfest become an annual event. In 1832, the date was moved some weeks later, as a Greek delegation came. It inspired them for the Zappas Olympics which became in 1896 the modern Olympic Games. Well, isn't that something, just last month someone asked me how the

modern Olympics started, so now you know!

Therefore, Halloween is always celebrated on **October 31.** The origin of Halloween can be traced to the ancient Gaelic festival of *Samhain* (pronounced *sow*-in, which rhymes with *cow*-in), meaning Summer's End when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. This festival celebrated the end of harvest time and the beginning of the "dark half" of the year. In later years, the Irish used hollowed-out, candlelit turnips carved with a demon's face to frighten away spirits. When Irish immigrants in the 1840s found few turnips in the United States, they used the more

October 13, 1792 - The cornerstone of the White House was laid by George Washington. 
